Effects inward man

"caring afterwards" (Matthew 21:29 and 32)

2 Corinthians 7:10
"For godly sorrow (grief)
worketh repentance to
salvation..."

Conviction over sin "they were pricked
in their heart"
(Acts 2:37)

The prelude to conversion

James 4:10 illustrates:
"Be afflicted, and mourn,
and weep: let your
laughter be turned to
mourning, and *your* joy to
heaviness."

Lehman Strauss: "We are not saved by our feelings, but neither do our feelings remain dead and senseless when we are saved."

Luke 18:13 - "God be merciful to me a sinner" and "Woe is me" (Isa. 6:5)

"And am no more worthy to be called thy son" (Luke 15:17)

The Root of Repentance (Change of Mind)

The basis of repentance

*Volitional Element

Effects inward man

The *inward* "change of mind" and attitude (Luke 13:3, 5; 15:7; Acts 3:19; 17:30; Acts 26:20)

A different attitude toward: Sin, Savior, and Salvation

Acts 3:19 - "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out..."

The act of conversion (when a person turns to God)

"Turned to God from idols" (1 Thess. 1:9)

"Repent and turn yourselves from your idols" (Ezek. 14:6) and "turn yourselves from all your transgressions" (Ezek. 18:30)

"turn them from darkness to light" (Acts 26:18)

No person can be saved if they are in rebellion against God (John 3:19).

"Father, I have sinned against heaven" (Luke 15:18; Ps. 51:4)

The Fruit of Repentance (Good Works)

The transformation of repentance

*Reformation Element

Effects outward man

The *outward* change that FOLLOWS repentance:

Following Christ
(Luke 9:23; 14:26-27)
Forsaking sin (Isa. 55:7)
Loving the brethren
(1 John 3:14)
Changing one's life
(2 Cor. 3:18)
Demonstrating holy living
(Rom. 6:22)

The result of conversion

"To serve the living and true God" (1 Thess. 1:9)

Matthew 3:8 - "Fruits meet (fitting) for repentance"

Acts 26:20 - "works meet for repentance"

Don't confuse the *root* of repentance with the *fruit* of repentance.

"I will arise and go to my father" (Luke 15:18). "And he arose, and came to his father" (Luke 15:20).
